SPECIAL DAYS IN MAY

Sunday May 10th is **Mother's Day**. On this day, many people in Canada say "thank you" to their mothers, or to people who are like mothers to them. They show their appreciation for all that their mothers do, for taking the time to care for them and help them through the challenges of life.

Some people give cards, flowers, or chocolates, and/or make handmade items or special meals on Mother's Day. Others take their mothers to the movies, a restaurant, café, or for a day in a park. Some mothers also receive special gifts such as jewelry, clothing, accessories, and gift vouchers for services or products.

Monday May 18th is **Victoria Day**. It celebrates the birthdays of both Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth II. Queen Victoria was born on May 24, 1819. It is a national holiday and schools and most businesses are closed. Many Canadians consider this the first long weekend of cottage season, (the time of year when people often spend weekends at the cottage, away from the city). Many towns will have fireworks displays on this weekend, so check your town's or city's website.

What can we do for you?

DID YOU KNOW?...

Level 1 (Beginner)

The canoe is a Canadian icon. An icon is a picture that represents something.



Level 2 (Intermediate)

The Native People of Canada used canoes to travel on water. These canoes were made of cedar trees and the bark from Birch trees, (birchbark). People learned how to build these canoes from their parents.

Level 3 (Advanced)

The main way of travelling on water for Canada's Aboriginal people was the birchbark canoe. The frame was made of cedar. The frame was covered in birchbark and the joints were sewn with spruce or white pine roots. The seams were coated with hot sap from pine trees to make them waterproof. The skills to build canoes were passed down from generation to generation.



FATHER'S DAY SUNDAY JUNE 21

On June 21st Canadians will celebrate Father's Day. People will express their appreciation and love for their fathers, or anyone that is like a father in their lives. This could involve spending time with these special people, buying them gifts or making something for them. School children will often bring home gifts that they have made in class for their fathers.

BERRY PICKING SEASON IS COMING SOON!!!

A tasty, kid-friendly activity in the Summer in Ontario is Berry Picking. There are many farms that allow you to "pick your own". Here is how to find a farm near you:

Go to http://ontarioberries.com/site/berry-info.html Click on Find a Farm by Location.

Click on the map until you find a farm close to you.

The weather will determine when the berries are ready to pick. In general, Strawberries are available in June/July, Raspberries are available in August, and Blueberries are available in August. Call the farm before going to the farm, to make sure the berries are available, and to find out what the picking conditions are, (for example, it could be very muddy). Some other suggestions are:

- Check if the farm provides containers or if you need to bring your own. Flatter containers are better so you don't squish your berries.
- Go picking early in the day to avoid arriving only to discover that the fields have been picked clean.
- Do not pile the berries too high in your basket or they will get squashed.
- Bring drinks and snacks.
- Don't forget hats and sunscreen for the sun.
