EASY WARM APPLE CIDER

In the cold Fall & Winter months, it is nice to have different hot drinks to enjoy. Apple Cider is a popular drink in Canada that is a nice change from coffee, tea or hot chocolate. Here is an easy recipe for warm apple cider that you may like to try: 1 bottle (2 L) apple cider. 3 cinnamon sticks 1 teaspoon whole allspice

1 teaspoon whole cloves 1/3 cup brown sugar

In a slow cooker, combine apple cider and cinnamon sticks. Wrap allspice and cloves in a small piece of cheesecloth, and add to pot. Stir in brown sugar. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat, and keep warm.

REMEMBRANCE DAY Tuesday November 11

Remembrance Day in Canada is when we take a moment to remember, and pay tribute, to all the people that served in World War I, and all the other military conflicts after World War I. (November 11, 1918 was the official end of World War I).

Red poppies symbolize all the people that have died serving our Country in these conflicts. Many people wear a plastic poppy on their clothes in the weeks before Remembrance Day. There are services held across the country on this day to honour the people that served. In Ontario, most schools are open, and children will attend a special assembly at their school to learn about Remembrance Day.

December is a Busy and Important Month!

December 25th: Christmas Day. Many Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ on this day by getting together with family and friends, exchanging gifts, attending a special church service and sharing a traditional meal. The traditional meal usually includes a roast turkey and pie for dessert. Almost all businesses and schools are closed. Christmas Eve is the night before Christmas Day. In many homes this is the night Santa Claus visits every child around the world, to deliver special Christmas gifts. These gifts are placed in the home, under the Christmas tree after the children are asleep. Children will also hang a stocking somewhere in their home for Santa to fill when he visits. Children are told that Santa only brings gifts for good girls and boys. People will decorate their homes with candles, wreaths, Christmas lights and Christmas ornaments. Symbols of Christmas:



The Christmas Tree – some families buy a real tree for their home, and some use an artificial tree that can be re-used year after year. The tree is decorated with colourful ornaments, lights and usually a star or angel on top.



Santa Claus – he lives in the North Pole and brings presents to good boys and girls around the world on Christmas Eve. He travels on his sleigh that is pulled by reindeer, and goes down the chimney of each home to deliver the gifts. See page 3 to find a Santa Claus Parade in your area.



Some people believe that **Angels** live in Heaven. Angels are an important part of the story of the birth of Jesus Christ. It was angels that brought messages from God and protected Jesus' parents, Mary and Joseph.



Candy Canes are peppermint flavoured candy. They are in the shape of a walking cane, or the letter "J". They are usually red and white. Children often give them to their friends at Christmas. Some people hang them on their Christmas trees



Homes are decorated at Christmas with wreaths, ornaments, bells and candles.

<u>December 26th</u> is Boxing Day. It is one of the biggest shopping days of the year in Canada as stores lower their prices to sell all of their goods before the end of the year.
