Canada is More Than English and French













Did you know that there are approximately 70 Indigenous languages in Canada?! That's a lot!

The languages are grouped into 10 language families. A language family is a group of languages that have the same ancestor. The different languages in a language family, share vocabulary and word structure.

Language families are found in specific areas of Canada. What are the language families found in different Canadian regions?

- East of Lake Winnipeg: Algonquian, Iroquoian
- Prairies: Algonquian, Dene, Siouan
- Subarctic: Dene, Algonquian, Eskimo-Aleut
- British Columbia: Salishan, Tsimshianic, Wakashan, Dene, Algonquian

In the latest census, the largest language family was Algonquian.

Why are many Indigenous languages in Canada endangered?

Historically, Europeans that settled in Canada wanted Indigenous people to become more like them. Governments created the Indian Act and residential schools that forced Indigenous people to stop speaking their native languages.

For example, students at the residential schools that were caught speaking their native language were punished. Even after the schools were closed, the fear of speaking Indigenous languages continued, which limited the passing of these languages on from one generation to the next.

In 2016, Statistics Canada reported that there are 500 or fewer speakers for 40 of the Indigenous languages.

In December of 2016, a law was passed to protect

created programs for learning, teaching, and documenting Indigenous languages.

The word nickname originated from the Middle English phrase ekename. Middle English was used from about 1150-1500. Ekename came from the fusion of two Middle English words: eke which meant also and name, (also-name). Over time, the word mutated to nickname and is an alternative name, often casual, and sometimes entertaining name given to someone or something.

FEBRUARY 2ND IS GROUNDHOG DAY - Thousands of years ago, people in



Europe (where Germany is now), believed that the badger could predict when spring would arrive. This tradition was brought to Canada, and because there were no badgers in Canada, it became the groundhog that made the prediction. If "Wiarton Willie" sees his shadow on February 2nd there will be 6 more weeks of winter. If he does not see his shadow, there will be an early spring.

CANADIAN HISTORY & CULTURE CORNER

The ancient game of lacrosse is older than Canada! The game was given to the indigenous people by the creator and was originally played by warriors on a field that was more than a kilometre long!

Lacrosse kept men fit for hunting and war, helped with diplomacy and honoured the gods. European settlers to Canada were intrigued. They learned the game and brought it to Europe in 1867.



LACROSSE



Lacrosse is a team sport. The objective is to shoot the ball into the net of the other team. Each team has a goalie. Each player carries a lacrosse stick with a netted pouch at one end. The players use the stick to carry, pass, catch and shoot the ball.

One modern team, the Iroquois Nationals, represent the Haudenosaunee indigenous team on both sides of the Canada-US border. They even travel with their own Haudenosaunee passport when competing.
